Midweek Service in Advent ... by Pastor John Smithies

 \mathcal{D} uring this advent season, we would like to experiment a bit with our worship space and normal practices. First, for this Advent, we will be holding our evening prayer service at 6:00pm instead of 7:00pm. We would like to do this both to ensure the safety of our members so they can drive home before it gets too late and also see if this is a helpful change.

Secondly, for those wishing to have time for reflection and prayer we are going to open the sanctuary on Wednesday from 12:00pm to 1:00pm.,This is a time for anyone to come and have space for prayer and reflection. We will provide votive candles and have some optional devotional material available for anyone wishing to come and rest.







During Advent, we enter the long, cold nights of December, descending into the deepest darkness of the year. It will be night when we go to bed and night when we wake up. In view of our Advent symbolism to work properly this must be true. I write this knowing that our friends in the southern hemisphere are celebrating summer. It would be worth while someday looking at the symbols they use, but that is an idea for a different day. But, for us and our ancestors what they did on these long cold nights was light a candle in the hope and trust that the sun would rise again. On the day the night was longest hearth, and home would be illuminated with light, hence our tradition of Christmas lights is an echo of this. An act of hope, an act of defiance against the night, an act of celebration that light would come.

Now I don't know if Jesus was born in December, and truth be told none can be certain. But, while we may not know the exact date of Jesus' birth, celebrating it during the longest nights of the year beautifully symbolizes the light of Christ entering our world's deepest nights. The Incarnation—the light of God born among us—resonates most powerfully in this season, when the cold and night are most keenly felt.

Is it not amazing that it is light that is the central symbol of this season. Light itself, which is both a particle and wave, the Incarnation defies comprehension: the divine light becomes human, dwelling among us. light which is surrounded by mystery. One could easily say that scientific adventure, at least in the quantum realm, is dedicated to understanding the mystery of light. Light is also the central symbol for the divine, maybe we are entering a period when we will understand that both science and religion are pursuing to understand the same mystery and that we both have a contribution and something to say. As science reveals more about the universe, it uncovers even deeper mysteries, mirroring the journey of faith: the more we learn about God, the more we encounter the infinite mystery of divine love.

Imagine a conversation between the top quantum scientist and the top theologian on what it would mean for light to be incarnated as a Child in a manger? What might it reveal about the nature of light, God, and reality itself? I raise all this with the hope that this year may be filled with awe and amazement at this deep mystery that speaks to the heart of us all. May we resist the urge to have a comfortable domesticated Christmas and feel the full weight of wonder and astonishment. Light has become us and is so doing reveals a truth about the nature of what light is. The mystery here is that in looking on this baby we can see the nature of who God is, which reflects the nature of what reality is and that reality is love.

Advent is that period in our church year where we try to prepare our hearts for the

mystery of Christmas. It is a time that challenges us to slow down, enter into deep prayer, light candles in hope, and connect ourselves back to this story of a God who comes to us. One way to do this is through silent prayer. Start small: set a timer for one or two minutes, read a short passage of Scripture, say the Lord's Prayer, and then sit quietly, resting in God's presence. When your mind wanders, gently refocus. Each week, try adding a minute to your silence, letting this practice draw you deeper into the mystery of the season.

May these long nights remind us that the Son of God has come, is here, and will come again to bring the fullness of God's light and love. This mystery begins now, illuminating the darkness with the promise of a light so radiant that, in the new creation, there will be no need for the sun.

Hello from the Library Committee


