Easter: A Moment of Unity

"God has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth."

-Ephesians 1:9-10

Did you know that Western and Eastern churches often celebrate Easter on different days? This difference stems from a long and complex history, primarily due to the use of different calendars: the Western Church follows the Gregorian calendar, while the Eastern Church uses the Julian calendar. If you're curious about the details, I encourage you to look it up—it's a fascinating history!

In ancient times, calendars were not fixed, and there was constant tension between solar and lunar dating systems. This same complexity appears in the Gospel accounts of Jesus' final days. Matthew, Mark, and Luke describe the Last Supper as the Passover meal, while John presents Jesus as being crucified on the day of Passover itself. While this may be a theological choice by the authors, it's also possible they were using different calendars—something common in first-century Jerusalem.

Given this ancient calendar confusion, it's no surprise that the Church never fully resolved the question of Easter's date. Over the centuries, the Western and Eastern traditions developed their own methods of calculation, leading to separate celebrations most years. However, every so often, the two calendars align, and Christians around the world celebrate Easter on the same day.

This year is one of those rare and special years. On Easter Sunday, the whole Christian world will join together in proclaiming the resurrection of our Lord!

As we reach that moment in our liturgy when we sing, "And so, with all the choirs of angels, with the church on earth and the hosts of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn," may our hearts soar in knowing that this is truly happening. Not only will we be singing with the saints and the angels, but also with our earthly siblings in Christ across every tradition and time zone.

This moment serves as a beautiful symbol of what Paul describes in Ephesians: that all things in heaven and on earth are gathered up in Christ. The Greek phrase here can also be translated as "sum up all things in him," pointing to a movement of unity, bringing everything together and leading it to its fullest expression. I am always struck by the phrase "all things, in heaven and on earth." All is a word of inclusion, not exclusion—it does not mean some. It certainly does not mean only those who assent to certain beliefs. How this aligns with other passages of Scripture that seem more exclusive is a mystery, but as Paul writes in Romans, "Let God be true and everyone else a liar" (Romans 3:4). My faith is that, despite the tensions and unresolvable questions, God is making all things right. God will gather up all things in Christ—both in heaven and on earth.

Spring itself speaks to this truth in both a literal and symbolic way. The world begins to

As Lent winds down and we prepare for Holy Week, I want to extend a warm invitation to everyone to experience the unique patterns and rhythms of worship that this sacred time offers. Holy Week is unlike any other time in the church year—rich with meaning, symbols, and deep theological truths.

I have long had a goal—though without a firm timeline—to write about the meaning of Holy Week worship, like my work on worship recently. For there is so much depth in its symbols and movements, and that is part of the beauty of this season. As we draw near to the most profound events of our faith, we find ourselves leaning on these symbols and stories more than ever. Holy Week, in many ways, is a dance with symbols—a kind of ballet in three parts.

Indeed, the services of the *Triduum*—Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil—are not separate events but one continuous act of worship. When we gather on Maundy Thursday, the service begins, but there is no final dismissal until the Easter Vigil. It is one long, unfolding mystery, inviting us into the light and life of God. Throughout these days, the elements that the ancients believed made up the world—fire, water, air, and earth—are all present, but are woven together and united by presence of Christ and the story of resurrection. We move between contrasts: light and darkness, silence and song, fasting and feasting. All of this leads us to the great joy of Easter morning, when we break the Lenten fast and celebrate Christ's victory over death.

The best way to experience Holy Week is to walk through it fully—to participate in the whole journey. Otherwise, it is like stepping into only one act of a three-act play. That being said, I know it is not always possible to attend every service, and all are welcome to come to any combination of them. Services will be held at 7:00 PM from Thursday through Saturday, and we will gather again on Sunday morning. I invite you to step into the sacred rhythm of this week—the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord—for the life of the world.

And that becomes our symbol for where this whole cosmic story is headed—the great mystery that all things will reach their fullness in Christ Jesus. *Everything in heaven and on earth!*

This Easter, as we stand in the presence of that great mystery, may we rejoice in the signs of new life all around us. And may we find joy in the unity of the Body of Christ, gathered together as one. For here, in the resurrection, is God's redemptive plan unfolding—the long cold night of sin and death giving way to the brightness of God's presence, love, and life through Christ Jesus.

Ms. Sinkins recently moved to Lincoln County after two decades practicing immigration law in the D.C. area. Her talk will cover what ICE can and cannot do, individual rights, and non-technical explanations of the law. Because of the complexity of the area, she will be unable to address particular cases nor will she be providing legal advice.

Contemplative Prayer Service

I won't deny it—I have wanted to lead a contemplative prayer service for a long time. All the great mystics of the Christian tradition—and, I might add, all mystical traditions—place a discipline of silence at their center. This is echoed throughout Scripture: prayer is the place where we encounter the mystery of God.

But sitting in silence takes work! It is far easier to speak poetically about the mystery of silence, as many of the great spiritual writers do, than it is to actually practice it. And yet, during this season of Lent, we have been journeying together into this mystery.

If you've ever wanted to dip your toe into the waters of silent prayer, I invite you to come and check out one of our services. We begin with a short devotion and some practical guidance on how to sit in silence, and then, as a gathered community, we simply do it—we rest in silence together.

As a rule, I try to spend at least an hour a day in silent prayer (though I don't always accomplish it). But practicing it with others is a unique and rewarding experience. It's like stepping into a monastery—without actually stepping into one.

Feel free to join us. And who knows? This practice may continue beyond Lent. In fact, I should say *it will*—whether it's after this Lent or another, this journey of silence is never truly over.

I n the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), we live out our faith in three interconnected expressions: the local congregation, the synod (a regional body of churches), and the churchwide organization that unites us all. You might think of these as layers of an onion or the repeating patterns of a fractal—each part reflecting and supporting the whole. Just as our congregation has a church council made up of its members, so too does the synod, and at the national level, the ELCA Churchwide organization.

I share this with you because I have been asked to run for an at-large position on the Synod Council at the upcoming Synod Assembly. I know that in the past, pastoral leadership from our congregation has moved into larger synod roles, and I want to be clear: I have no desire or call to leave our beloved community—or the waves that grace our backdoor. My heart remains here.

Serving on Synod Council would involve a three-hour Zoom meeting every other month on a Saturday, along with an annual in-person retreat, hopefully this will not be during peak surfing season. Haha! Like our own church council, this is a volunteer position—one that allows me to serve where there is a need. I often encourage members of our congregation to step forward into leadership roles, and now, in a bit of poetic justice, I find myself in the same position. May we always have the boldness to step into the gap when we are able, trusting that God equips us for the work before us. Rest assured my beloveds I am going nowhere, simply adding a little bit more work on my plate.
